Welcome! On June 10-12, 2020, KHQS Annual Meeting and Getaway will once again convene in Cave City, KY. Our meetings, classes and meals are located in the Cave City Convention Center. Lodging is less than a quarter mile away. All facilities are handicapped accessible and have adequate parking.

General Schedule Information

Registration begins at **7:00 am** on Wednesday at the Convention Center. First day classes will start at **8 or 9 am (verify your class schedule)**. Thursday and Friday classes will begin at **8:30 am** so we can fit in more fun! KHQS, QAK and KHAS annual meetings are held during Getaway as well. Getaway ends at 4pm on Friday. 

Our Featured Teacher: Nancy Prince



Nancy Prince, an award winning quilt artist from Orlando, FL, specializes in thread painting. Nancy and Linda French are the co-winners of the 2014 Handi-Ouilter Best of Show award for On This Winter Day at the International Quilt Festival in Houston, and in 2016 at the HMQS show in Salt Lake City and Shipshewana Quilt Festival in Shipshewana, Indiana. She is the author of two books Simple Thread Painting and Thread Painting with Style. She currently has a show and classroom lessons on www.thequiltshow.com. Her quilts have appeared in national

magazines and have won numerous quilting awards. She has received First Place Pictorial winner at American Quilter's Society Quilt Show in Paducah and Best of Show at the NQA Quilt Show. Other awards have included 16 Viewer's Choice Awards, Most Creative Use of Thread, Artistic Merit, Outstanding Innovative Quilt and Judge's Recognition at recent shows. Wednesday All day

Featured Teacher—Nancy Black & White & red Prince All Over



Black and white fabric is prevalent in most quilt shops and is a very creative option to thread paint some amazing designs. Thread painting on commercial fabric is as easy as 1.2.3. In this workshop you will learn how to blend thread to make the finished flower look realistic. With the design printed, it is easy to begin your thread painting adventure. Once you have taken this class, you will never look at black and white fabric the same.

Thread Sketching Thread - 40 weight rayon or polyester

- Flower Dark cranberry, medium red, reddish/orange, medium yellow
- Flower center medium rust, bright yellow
- Leaves 3 shades of green from a dark olive to a light olive
- Invisible thread (available for sale in class)
- Bring additional 40 weight threads in rayon or polyester in greens, red, yellow & brown

Want to give character to your characters? Realistic designs are achieved by incorporating shadows and highlights into a design/ Learn the design parameters required to shade and highlight with thread to create realism. All aspects of each design are demoed via camera and projector so it is almost like having a private lesson with me. A preprinted design easily guides you through each step. So come see how easy the process is and how much fun creating designs in thread can be!

- Clear invisible thread or white or light color 100 weight polyester (for sale in workshops)

NOTE: No thread had been listed for the face and arms as a 100 weight thread is recommended. This will be discussed in the workshop

Getaway 2020 Teachers



Discover how fun it is to make fabric postcards in this hands-on workshop. You'll learn how to put the "quilt sandwich" together, create and embellish cards for all occasions, and finish off a card that can go in the mail. Three different, flexible techniques will be covered along with time to play with fabric, embellishments, and your machine. Your domestic machine will be used for assembling, quilting, decorating, and edging your postcards. We'll learn to use fusible web for securing pieces, fussy cutting for simple rough edge appliqué, and creating a scrappy collage silhouette for your cards. You will be creating between 3 and 5 postcards...but you won't be able to stop from making more.

6" x 20" of one sided fusible stabilizer (Pellon 71F Peltex Ultra Firm Fusible Stabilizer)

3 - 4 sheets of 9" x 12" double sided light weight fusible web

Optional: nonstick sewing machine needle for Steam-A-Seam users

2 sheets of 12" by 12" or 3 sheets of 9" x 12" Cardstock 80 - 110 pound wt. in a light color

"Textured" paper gives a nice finished card

Fabric for background pieces, fabrics for fussy cutting, and scraps you love.

Cards are 4" x 6" so pieces under 5" x 7" are big enough, even smaller pieces can work,

3 - 5 pieces of solid or small-scale patterned fabric about 4" x 6" in a similar colorway (for collage work)

Several colors of thread on spool, light and dark thread for bobbins

Scraps for flat embellishment such as ribbons, rick rack, lace, cord, translucent fabrics, etc. You won't need much, but it's fun to have a selection.

Glue Stick - white, like Elmer's All purpose Glue Stick

Scissors for fussy cutting - Optional: I recommend a pair like Karen Kay Buckley's micro serrated blades or at least a pair with fine, sharp points.

Sewing machine with at least a zigzag stitch. *Presser foot with wide opening (suitable for decorative stitches)

Basic sewing supplies with rotary cutter and cutting board

Iron and pressing cloth

If you are comfortable free motion quilting, bring your hopping foot. Technique will not be taught but is an option when embellishing.

Instructor will have some extra embellishment materials for your use. Pellon 71F, fusible web, and cardstock will be available for purchase.



This class will explore a myriad of ways to finish and display wool appliqué designs other than as pillows or in frames. If you have a stitched item that you don't know how to finish, this will be a great opportunity to get some new ideas! Some of the techniques discussed will include making different shapes of pincushions, picking the right stuffing material, hiding closures or less-than-perfect stitches, and adding that special edge finish or embellishment that takes your wool appliqué item beyond the ordinary to the extraspecial. We will look at styles ranging from primitive to whimsical, from formal to casual, from practical items to just-for-fun gifts, and how to put them together. If you do other types of needlework (cross-stitch, for example) and have a drawer or bin full of stitched but not finished pieces, this class will help you too!

Modern Quilt Sampler



Spools, continued:

In this workshop, students will learn a quick-piece, template-free, no-waste method for constructing the *Spools* block. Make this wallhanging in colors that will complement your sewing space or your family room to advertise your passion for quiltmaking.

The wallhanging may be made as a three-fabric quilt or as a scrap quilt. Beginning quilters are advised to choose the three-fabric option. Intermediate quilters may choose a scrap quilt option, in order to take advantage of their already-bulging fabric stashes, and to add a mild design challenge to this easy wallhanging.

Machine Piecing

FABRICS FOR THREE-FABRIC QUILT (Beginners and Intermediates)

Fabrics for three-fabric quilt [100% cotton, pre-washed, ironed] I prefer to pre-wash; some quiltmakers do not. Whether you do or don't is up to you.)

1¹/₂ yd. main color (for spools, outer border, and binding)

¹/₂ yd. secondary color (for spools)

1¹/₄ yd. background color (for background and inner border)

Fabrics to complete the project (You will not need these during the workshop, but you will need them later to complete the project):

 $1\frac{3}{4}$ yd. for backing and sleeve

1/3 yd. for binding [There will be enough of the main color (spools and border), listed above, to do the binding, so there's no need for extra, unless you want a different color for the binding.]

FABRICS FOR SCRAP QUILT (Intermediates only). Intermediate quilters will enjoy the challenge of the "design" process and the "stash-busting" element of the scrap option.

You know in which category you fall – and if you don't, call me for advice.

Fabrics for scrap quilt [100% cotton, pre-washed, ironed]

1¹/₄ yd. background color (for background and inner border)

Fabric scraps: The wallhanging has 18 whole spools, and an option for an additional 14 partial spools.

<u>18 whole spools</u>: If you want 18 whole spools only, cut 18 squares, roughly 8" x 8" (Don't obsess over this – these can be cut 8" x 8", 8" x 9", or 9" x 9" – we'll cut them to the correct sizes in class.)

<u>18 whole spools, plus 14 partial spools</u>: If you want to include the partial spools, and if you want every spool to be different, you will need 32 different scraps, each cut roughly 8" x 8", as above. However, for ease of selecting and packing, you may wish to repeat some fabrics in the partial spools.

Spools, Donna Duncan, continued:

If you're afraid you might make a mistake, you may want to bring a few extra squares. A few extras will also increase your design options. (Just don't bring a "boat-load" – that will only frustrate you!)

Fabrics to complete the project (You will not need these during the workshop, but you will need them later to complete the project):

 $1\frac{1}{4}$ yd. for outer border – This will make continuous border cut on the lengthwise grain. And actually, if you're digging border fabric from your stash, you will need a piece about 20" wide and $1\frac{1}{4}$ yd. long.)

If you are willing to cut your outside border from the crosswise grain, 2/3 yard will be sufficient.

 $1\frac{3}{4}$ yd. for backing and sleeve 1/3 yd. for binding

TOOLS AND NOTIONS FOR THREE-FABRIC SPOOLS QUILT OR SCRAP SPOOLS QUILT:

Thread

Scissors

Sewing machine with extra needles and bobbins

[Sewing machine should be checked, oiled, and ready to sew! (Don't forget the foot pedal!!! You might also bring attachments, machine tools, and owner's manual – just in case!)]

Extension cord

Iron and ironing surface (two or more can share)

Rotary cutter with good blade

Cutting mat

Acrylic quilter's ruler(s) (Omnigrid, Quilter's Rule, Nancy Crow or similar ruler) [For ease of cutting, it is nice to have more than one ruler: a large one (maybe 6" x 24" or 6¹/₂" x 24"), a medium-sized one (4¹/₂" x 14"), and a small square one (6" x 6"). A 6" x 1" ruler is also nice. Don't go out and buy extra rulers, but if you have these four sizes, bring them. Otherwise, just bring whatever you have.]

Pins

Pencils to mark fabrics (regular lead pencil, mechanical pencil, or Berol silver,

canary yellow, or white – whatever works best on your fabrics)

Pencil and paper for note-taking

Seam ripper

1 sheet fine grade sandpaper (approximately 9" x 11"), or sandpaper board (to use as marking surface)

Thin, 6" ruler, if you have one (thinner than the acrylic ruler that you use with your rotary cutter)

Spools, continued:

Colored pencils that approximate the colors of your fabrics. (If you are choosing the scrap quilt option, there is no need to bring "colored pencils that approximate the colors of your fabrics" – that would just be too hard!)

Glue Stick (for those who choose the scrap quilt option)

Supply fee: \$7 (for pre-marked design surface)

Optional items: Anything else that is necessary for your quilting comfort and pleasure (thread snips, magnetic pin-picker-upper, reading glasses, pincushion, chocolate, portable lamp, colored pencils, and doodle pad—you know what <u>you</u> need to be happy!)

Bio – Donna Duncan learned to sew when she was nine, and is skilled in dressmaking, knitting, crochet, and counted cross-stitch. When she learned to quilt in 1983, all other needlearts took a back seat to quiltmaking. A college math major, Donna finds the geometry of quilts particularly fascinating, and enjoys the design process, using traditional quilt designs as a "jumping-off" point. She was the first recipient of the *KHQS Shakertown Quilters' Seminar* (now *Quilting Adventures*) Scholarship. Donna began sharing her skills by teaching quiltmaking in 1986. Her teaching style incorporates skill, knowledge, encouragement, and a sense of fun and adventure. She served on the KHQS Board of Directors for nineteen years (as Newsletter Editor, President, Treasurer, and Publicity Chairperson), and continues to support KHQS by serving on committees and writing occasional articles for the *Newsletter*. For twenty-five years, she took the *KHQS Challenge Quilts* Traveling Exhibit to area schools, and showed and explained the quilts to some two thousand students over a four- or five-week period. Appropriately, she has come to be known by local schoolchildren as "The Quilt Lady."



In this class you will learn a no hassle method for sewing circles using the decorative stitches on your sewing machine. No special attachment is required for this class; however, if you own a circle attachment you may bring and use it. This is a fun way to experiment with your decorative stitches and with different colors and kinds of thread. We all have times we just want to go to the machine and sew and not have to worry about being precise or following instructions. This technique is great fun for that.

The Planets Align: This project is a great way to use those decorative stitches on your sewing machine that look so nice on the chart. The wall hanging is made using a Circular Sewing Attachment (Please be familiar with how to attach the attachment to your machine). You will be sewing the circles onto the background of your quilt and then use the decorative stitches and various threads to sew around the circles. Borders will be added and then the quilt will be quilted with additional decorative stitches. Borders are quilted with free motion quilting as you wish. You should make sure your machine is in good working concondition and is clean with a new needle that is compatible with your thread.

The Planets Align-Supply List

Sewing Machine with decorative stitches in good working condition. You might want to bring your manual for the machine also. **Don't forget to pack the power cord and foot**.

Circular Attachment for your machine. Make sure you know how to attach it to the machine bed.

Open Toed or Applique Foot for your machine.

Background Fabric (24" X27" - or size you wish to make). You will also need about ³/₄ yard for the outside border. I used white on white but you can use any light colored fabric.

Fusible interfacing (SF101-you can get at JoAnn's or other fabric stores). It is a lightweight woven interfacing used in garment construction. You will need it to be as big as you decide to make your background fabric.

Lightweight Fusible webbing (Soft Fuse, Light weight Heat and Bond, Hot Fix Adhesive). You will need to sew around the pieces so make sure you get the one you can sew through. *DO NOT GET THE ULTRA FUSIBLE THAT DOES NOT ALLOW YOU TO SEW AROUND THE PIECES.

Cotton Batting or Fusible Fleece

Quilt Backing

Inside Border Fabric- about 1/3 yard

Outside Border Fabric- about ³/₄ yard. I used the same as the background fabric.

Various colors of thread.

Needles that are compatible with your thread

Scissors, snips, Appliques Scissors to cut close to your stitching. I use my curved snips but applique scissors will work also.

Scrap fabrics cut approximately 12" X 12" for practicing making circles.

Regular sewing supplies-pins, rotary cutter, cutting mat, iron and mat, fabric scissors, electrical tower or strip. If you have a small iron, you may want to bring it and an ironing mat or board. There will be irons and ironing boards supplied but you may want one of you own.



If you've been curious about what improvisational strip piecing is and how to create your own block using this method, then this is the class for you! Because of the improvisational nature of our work and my strong recommendation to cut all of your strips without a ruler, no two quilts will be the same. (But it's your quilt, so if you want to use a ruler, that's AOK. Just give freehand a try first.)

If you've been curious about what improvisational strip piecing is and how to create your own block using this method, then this is the class for you! Because of the improvisational nature of our work and my strong recommendation to cut all of your strips without a ruler, no two quilts will be the same. (But it's your quilt, so if you want to use a ruler, that's AOK. Just give freehand a try first.)

We will begin with black and white fabric to create a band of pieced fabric, using a variation of the Seminole Strip Piecing method. Then, we will add colorful strips of fabric on either side of our black and white band to create a block that measures 10+ inches. The morning will be used to create about 8 of these blocks.

Next, we will square up each block to 10 inches and then cut off each of the 4 corners to create 7 inch blocks with the black and white strip now on the diagonal. The afternoon will be used to design a small wall quilt using these blocks, then sew them together, and begin the quilting process. Or, if you prefer, you can continue to create more blocks. I will share some of the quilts I've made using this process, some variations on the process, and what to do with all those leftover triangles!

Supply list:

Sewing machine with regular and/or ¼" foot and several needles Regular sewing supplies and tools (scissors, pins, seam ripper, etc.) Rotary cutter and cutting mat (at least 24" long) Ruler – at least 24" long Neutral thread Batting and backing fabric for the finished piece –optional –(quilt top is 13 ½ x 26)

Fabric:

½ yard each of black and white
½ yard black and white geometric print (optional)
2/3 yards each of the fabrics in your chosen color palette

I suggest a color palette of two complementary colors or three colors in a triad. Three analogous colors with a *complimentary* pop of color would also work well. Each color should include a light, medium, and dark. For example, if you choose blue, be sure to include a light value, a medium value, and a dark value in blue. I work with solids and that is probably the best choice for this quilt. Improvisational Quilting, continued

It's never a bad idea to include "extra fabrics" in order to have more choices when designing. For example, you might include some blue green or blue violet along with your blue, or shades of blue that look good together. The 2/3 and 1/2 yards are needed for your color palette and values, but it is fine to bring smaller amounts of these "extra fabrics." They do need to be 11 or 12 inches in length, since we're making 10-inch blocks. The more you have to choose from, the better.

Homework: It will really help to cut up some of your strips before the class so you can get started on strip piecing right away. I'd suggest cutting about half of each of the fabrics ahead of time. For the black and white fabrics (and optional geometric black and white prints), all 18" in length, cut a variety of widths (approximate widths since you're not using a ruler) from 1" to 2 ¼". **Definitely do this part ahead of time!** For your color palette (24" in length), do the same. Don't cut up everything because you want to be able to make design decisions about the size of your strips while you're working. You'll cut each 24" strip in half for two 12" strips of fabrics.

Bio - Vickie Wheatley I am a retired teacher and I've been making things with cloth since the 8th grade, from traditional bed quilts to camping gear. These days I am predominately a contemporary quilt maker, dyeing my own fabric and using it to create original designs. My current series, *Anxieties*, is made up of quilts with an underlying structure created by the diagonal black and white pieces, as well as a sense of tension, or anxiety, in the complexity of the added layers of fabric and stitching.

In 2018 and 2019, two quilts in the series, *Imperfections* and *The River Lethe*, were part of the national juried quilt show, Form, Not Function, at the Carnegie Center in New Albany, IN. Also, in the past 2 years, *Imperfections, Breakdown*, and *Acrophobia* were included in the international juried show, Quilts-Art-Quilts at the Schweinfurth Gallery in Auburn, NY. Q: I want to register online, but I'm not sure how. What should I do?

A: There are multiple options for assistance. First, check the tutorials for online registration starting on page 44. KENTUCKY HERITAGE QUILT SOCIETY

History

In 1981, a group of quilt lovers, quilt makers and quilt collectors joined together to form the Kentucky Heritage Quilt Society, the first statewide organization to be concerned with all aspects of quilting throughout the Commonwealth of Kentucky. Since that small beginning, our individual membership has grown with members in almost every county and almost 50 affiliate guilds. Purpose

To promote understanding, appreciation and knowledge of the art and craft of quilt making.

To support and expand the collection and preservation of Kentucky quilts and the records of Kentucky quilt makers and their work.

To undertake such activities as shows, contests and educational workshops.

The Kentucky Heritage Quilt Society is an equal opportunity organization whose membership enrollment does not discriminate on the basis of gender, age, race, or religion.

Activities

Workshops are held at the annual KHQS Meeting & Getaway in June. Each fall, quilters gather with a nationally known teacher for the three-day KHQS Quilting Adventures.

KHQS, along with QAK and KHAS hold several retreats throughout the year.

Quilt Registry Days are held in counties across Kentucky. From these, information of use to the academic and museum world is collected and stored at the Kentucky Museum in Bowling Green.

KHQS has organized 13 districts across the state. District Leaders create the link between local, state, and national quilters. National Quilting Day, which had its beginnings in Kentucky, is celebrated on the third Saturday in March. KHQS Districts celebrate this special

day with Quilters' Day Out events in each district across the state.

In 1995, the Kentucky Heritage Appliqué Society (KHAS) was formed as an auxiliary group of KHQS. Its purpose is to promote the techniques, appreciation and preservation of hand and machine appliqué. In 2004, the Quilt Artists of Kentucky (QAK) formed with the purpose to serve as a support and information group for innovative quilters who choose to practice creativity with quilts as an art form; to educate about the art of the quilt; and explore venues for art quilt exhibition. <u>Members of</u> these groups must also be members of KHOS.

KHQS actively works to keep the art and craft of quilt making alive by providing judges, teachers and demonstrations at shows and special events. KHQS offers financial assistance to affiliate guilds who hold quilt shows. Scholarships are offered for the annual Quilting Adventures. Each year members can participate in quilt block contests and a quilt challenge. The challenge quilts then become a traveling exhibit viewed by thousands of people over the course of a year. Newsletter

The newsletter is published four times a year for the membership. The newsletter is full of information about the quilting world, up-coming shows and exhibits, free patterns and, of course, up-to-date information on all KHQS activities.

Dues

Individual KHQS membership dues are \$20.00 annually. Guilds and quilt clubs may also join as KHQS Affiliates for an annual fee of \$15.00. Dues for the Kentucky Heritage Appliqué Society and Quilt Artists of Kentucky are both \$5.00 annually. Contributions are always welcome. Individual members are given discounts to lectures workshops hosted by the Society.
